## Dr. Bob's Library and Research Center

We are excited to share with you our latest educational project in support of the third part of our mission statement:

"... to educate the local community and beyond on how Dr. Bob's Home played a part in the formation of Alcoholics Anonymous and the manner in which alcoholics were helped in the early days."

One need only look at books read by someone to get a sense of who they were. Dr. Bob read voraciously. He often stayed up late and left piles of books all around 855 Ardmore. His interests ranged from Christianity to metaphysics. He had an extensive reading list, often recommending and sharing books. Bill noted Dr. Bob's reading habits and library in a letter to Mel B.:

"Unlike me he was a vast reader of spiritual and psychic literature. He had a vast library of it."

We are delighted to announce the opening of Dr. Bob's Library and Research Center. We have collected a substantial inventory of books from the time period that were read and widely shared by Dr. Bob, Anne Smith and the early pioneers of Alcoholics Anonymous. We have also reconstructed Dr. Bob's collection of esoteric and metaphysical literature which occupied his interests later in life.

The library holdings include:

- Bookcase A: Dedicated to earlier movements addressing alcoholism: The Emmanual Movement, Temperance and Prohibition.
- Bookcase B: An extensive collection of Oxford Group books and pamphlets.
- Bookcase C & D: Christian authors that were widely read by early AAs, including James Allen, Glen Clark, Henry Drummond, Emmet Fox and Sam Shoemaker.
- Bookcase E: Books relating to metaphysics, esoteric learnings and Eastern thought, including books on Confucius, histories of world religions, mysticism and spiritual healing.



Dr. Bob's books were as varied as his interests. However, they reflected his quest for greater spiritual understanding. From Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers:

"To the day [Dr. Bob] died, he felt that if he only had more spiritual understanding, some way or another he could pass this message on."

From his books, we know that Bob was a seeker, and he sought so that others might find.

The library is housed in the A.W.E. Center at 122 Everett Ave., directly adjacent to Dr. Bob's Home. Our hope is to have it open on Saturday and Sunday (noon-3 p.m.) and by appointment. Although not a lending library, visitors and researchers are welcome to experience the content and the vast amount available to better understand the roots of the "greatest spiritual and social movement of the last century."

## Dr. Bob's hosts NEOIMC

On July 18, Dr. Bob's Home was pleased to host the summer '23 meeting of the Northeastern Ohio Inter-Museum Council. Founded in 1942, The Northeastern Ohio Inter-Museum Council serves over 140 institutional members in Cuyahoga and six adjacent counties. Members range from large, internationally renowned (Cleveland Museum of Art) museums in major urban centers to metro parks, nature facilities and small local history museums spread across northern Ohio.

The text below was our introduction to their members:

This National Historic Site was the home of Dr. Robert Smith (Dr. Bob), a co-founder of Alcoholics Anonymous. Beginning in 1935, the home was a place of spiritual collaboration between Dr. Bob and Bill Wilson, the other co-founder in their joint efforts to save the lives of others afflicted with alcoholism. That collaborative is now a worldwide program. The three home campus includes the original furnishings of the historic home and two other houses.

The feedback was overwhelmingly positive and the questions from the delegates reflected their understanding and appreciation of the Home's significance. This is a major step in raising the profile of Dr. Bob's Home as a historical site and a focus of scholarly research.

We also are pleased to be enjoying the continuing visits from our local medical and legal communities. Every six weeks a new group of nursing students from Kent State University, groups of residents from the Cleveland Clinic and employees of the Summit County Courts visit the Home to gain deeper understanding.

Sharing the miracle of what happened here with the world at large is a significant part of our mission and if done well, the results seem to manage themselves.

## Goodbye to an Old Friend: The Closing of St. Thomas Hospital



St. Thomas Hospital has served the Akron community since opening its doors in 1928. It also holds a special place in the history of Alcoholics Anonymous. In 1939, Dr. Bob and Sister Ignatia opened one of the first hospital-based treatment facilities at St. Thomas. Since then, the ward,

later named Ignatia Hall, has helped countless individuals suffering from alcoholism. Her practice of handing out scapular medals to newcomers has echoes in the present-day practice of offering sobriety chips at meetings. Patients detoxing in the ward would be allowed to view religious services from the choir loft in the chapel. Sister Ignatia was an accomplished musician and often provided music for mass.

In 2021, St. Thomas Hospital closed, and the future of the historic structure remains uncertain. However, elements of the chapel and the Sister Ignatia Heritage Center have been relocated to Summa Hospital and St. Vincent and St. Mary's High School. Recognizing the close bond between Dr. Bob and Sister Ignatia, as well as their shared history, the commemorative plaque from the center was donated to Dr. Bob's Home.



#### **Our Mission**

Our primary purpose is to maintain, restore and preserve the property at 855 Ardmore Avenue, which was the family home of physician Robert Holbrook Smith, affectionately called Dr. Bob, one of the founding fathers of Alcoholics Anonymous. This historic site in Akron, Ohio is the birth place of this internationally known fellowship, which subsequently became the foundation of numerous 12-step programs that are improving the lives of millions.

Second, our ongoing mission is to help alcoholics by preserving the atmosphere of acceptance where early members achieved and maintained their sobriety. This prevailing attitude is simply expressed in our greeting, "Welcome Home."

Third, we educate the local community and beyond on how Dr. Bob's Home played a part in the formation of Alcoholics Anonymous and the manner in which alcoholics were helped in the early days.
