As research has been collected, changes are being made to preserve the original integrity of the home, located at 855 Ardmore Avenue in Akron, Ohio. Preservation experts uncovered the original color of the home and it has recently been painted black and gray with white trim. These are the same colors as when Dr. Bob sobered up and when he and Anne opened their doors to suffering and searching alcoholics. The porches and windows have also been reconstructed and spouting replaced. It is truly... BREATHTAKING! Valuable possessions and personal items have also been collected and returned to their proper location throughout the home. Other books, photos, literature and items of significance are displayed at the neighboring home at 859 Ardmore.

It is important to preserve the home and personal items which once belonged to Dr. Bob, Annie, Smitty and Sue. This is not a responsibility taken lightly and steps are being taken to ensure these priceless items are available for many generations to come. A house manual is being produced and procedures implemented to provide proper cleaning and preservation



protocols for these precious items. Only the safest cleaning products are used and a temperature/humidity control log is being kept to ensure the maximum "life" of the wood furniture, photos, books, etc.

Positive changes are taking place to enhance the atmosphere and educate visitors about the history of the home. The house played a vital role for many people that began when Bill W. was the first alcoholic guest of the Smiths. It became a refuge for many more and offered a feeling of acceptance and hope. Since that time, its very existence has influenced and impacted the lives of millions of alcoholics world-wide. Much time is devoted to making Dr. Bob's Home a memorable experience for all and it is with great privilege that volunteers continue to do whatever necessary, even when it requires giving after hours. We want to not only welcome you home, but provide and maintain the home for years and years to come.

This year, the Founders' Day celebration marks the 81st year since the infamous meeting between Bill Wilson, a rum hound from New York, and Dr. Robert Holbrook Smith, an Akron physician. Preservation, restoration and education

The year 2016 has untold opportunities for the continuation of preservation, renovation and restoration of Dr. Bob's Home at 855 Ardmore Avenue.

In 2015, we completed Phase I and Phase II of a three-phase external restoration project called "The Second Century Campaign." This project will take us into the "second century" as Dr. Bob's Home turned 100 years old in 2015.

Since we have the elite designation of being a National Historic Landmark, we are required to meet the highest standards when it comes to historical accuracy. To that end, we contracted a specialist who completed a diligent and

systematic inquiry to discover the exact colors, designs and all the properties of the original house. This working document, completed after extensive research, is phenomenal! We now have a paint analysis and construction drawings as well as construction and carpentry recommendations for use now and into the future. This document will be in existence in perpetuity.



Since the completion of Phase I and Phase

II, there has been a remarkable transformation of the house. Please come see the new-old house. This is an experience you must not miss!

Phase III of this project, which will be completed this year, includes carpentry, painting, lap siding and trim work, and of course, additional construction drawings and management.

This project, however, does not include the requisites of the interior of the home. We also need to keep in mind Dr. Bob's Home has the "house next door," which is used for archives, historical displays, administrative offices and our gift shop. Obviously, much of the same scope that is used for Dr. Bob's Home is applicable for this house, too.

For example, both houses need new HVAC systems so we may protect our records and maintain our archival excellence. Both these systems will be replaced this year. Both houses are also scheduled for interior remodeling, maintenance and repair throughout 2016.

These major undertakings that are planned for 2016 will be partially funded by supplementary initiatives and grants. However, a substantial amount of the funding that is needed will have to come from the traditional source of individual contributions. Your generosity is greatly appreciated.
